In October, we welcomed new participants into the *Upward* Leadership portion of our Leadership Pathway, a key part of our 20-year journey.


In partnership with Muskoka Woods, we took our grade 11 and 12 students, along with a few older graduating StreetLeaders, on a weekend retreat designed to build community and strengthen their understanding of what it means to be a bridge builder.

A central theme of every retreat is the concept of the "choice to try." We encourage each participant to define what "trying" means for her and to step outside her comfort zone in a way that feels meaningful.

During an afternoon activity, I witnessed this in a very real way. At the rock climbing wall, I saw one participant sitting in a chair, focused on her phone. I approached her and asked what her "try" would be for this activity. She candidly replied that her plan was to remain seated. I gently encouraged her to reflect on what it might look like to adopt a "trying" mindset and suggested she start small—perhaps by putting on a harness just to see how it felt.

A little while later, I noticed her moving toward the bouldering wall. Quietly and on her own, she began testing the holds and attempting to climb. I smiled and continued to observe from a distance. To my surprise and delight, just a few minutes later, she had not only put on a harness and helmet but was also approaching the instructor to get clipped into the belay. She climbed a third of the wall!

This participant didn't just define her "try" for this activity—she exceeded her own expectations of what she thought she could accomplish. Watching her step out of her comfort zone and grow in confidence was a powerful reminder of the transformative potential of these experiences. Seeing our youth discover their capabilities and embrace new challenges is an incredible privilege as they develop their leadership skills.



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
